Michele Meza, also known as Coach Michele D, finds herself working with People who cannot overcome mental blocks or irrational thoughts, which affect their daily lives, their businesses, and their relationships. People that are entrepreneurs who want to grow and scale their businesses to 6+ figures; startups who don't know where to start and small business owners who need help with streamlining business operations, business or marketing strategy, branding and digital design, help with content, and social media management.

In the beginning

Michele has always had the entrepreneurial spirit; self-starter, a gogetter, strong work ethic – her first job was at 14, dipping minnows for local fisherman at a convenient store in town and by the time she was a senior in high school, she was the assistant manager, and also managed the sno-cone stand owned by the same person.

Meza also started her first business her sophomore year in high school – a car detailing business.

Graduating with a Bachelor's degree in Entrepreneurship from Bacone College and majored in Marketing – Meza went on to work for la local college newspaper as a reporter, cartoonist and sold and designed ads. Not long after, she obtained her MBA from University of Phoenix.

Since then, she's been a private business consultant since 2010, where she worked with CEOs and executives teaching them how to streamline their operations and created leadership and training programs to develop their people.

A major life change happened that led her to become a single

mother in 2012. Even though her dreams of solely being selfemployed were temporarily put on hold, she still managed to launch an eCommerce business while being a w2 employee.

Also in 2012, she launched a clothing company for girls. It started out as a necessity for girls needed outfits for dance, and ended up becoming a business. Her designs have been featured in magazines all over the world, runways in the USA, was featured on Zulily and top trending pins on Pinterest and expanded into bridal industry.

Since then, she's owned and sold a successful cleaning company where she completed commercial projects with local tribes and employed single moms, tribal citizens and partnered with local reintegration programs where she trained and employed women who were recently incarcerated and needed job stability and a second chance.

During Covid, she re-branded her company, added additional certifications for mindset coaching and added additional digital marketing services, Luksi Coaching and Consulting. Additionally, the serial entrepreneur will soon launch another business involving real estate.

If that's not enough, she also became a 2x International Bestselling author, where she co-authored and published two books: "Shattering the Stigma of Single Motherhood" released in 2022, and "Dream Big, Do Bigger" that released at the beginning of this year.

Her Journey

Over the last two decades, she's helped thousands of people and organizations. Here's a powerful story of impact and transformation:

Barrett Receives Community Recognition

Citizen Potawatomi Nation Chairman John "Rocky" Barrett recently received recognition from two Oklahoma organizations.

Barrett will share his leadership and expertise by serving as a director on the Oklahoma Hall of Fame and Gaylord-Pickens Museum board. His term began in January.

Barrett was inducted into the Shawnee Educational Foundation's Hall of Fame on March 21. The SEF Hall of Fame honors former students of a Shawnee-area school who have made significant contributions to education.

Oklahoma Hall of Fame

Barrett will serve a three-year term. The Oklahoma Hall of Fame and Gaylord-Pickens Museum are governed by a

board of directors representative of the state of Oklahoma.

The Oklahoma Hall of Fame was founded in 1927 to honor Oklahomans who gave outstanding service to the state during their lifetime and to provide educational programming for students of all ages through the museum and outreach programs, according to the Hall of Fame's website.

"We are thrilled and proud to have him on the board and that he's able to bring his expertise and leadership to our organization," said Shannon L. Rich, president and CEO, Oklahoma Hall of Fame and Gaylord-Pickens Museum.

"I am honored to serve as a board member for the Oklahoma Hall of Fame," Barrett said. "Potawatomi families were among the first people to establish homes in 1873 in then-Indian Territory. Indigenous history is Oklahoma history. I am pleased to support the Oklahoma Hall of Fame's mission of telling Oklahoma's story through its people."

Through exhibits and experiences at the Gaylord-Pickens Museum, the Oklahoma Hall of Fame preserves Oklahoma's unique history and promotes pride in the state.

"The key mission of our organization is to tell Oklahoma stories through its people, and we do that by recognizing our inductee class every year at the annual induction ceremony and recognize incredible Oklahomans that way," said Michelle Sopp, director of marketing and communications for the Oklahoma Hall of Fame.

With Barrett's executive experience and longtime support of educational endeavors, Sopp believes the board found a perfect fit.

"He is joining a board of directors of more than 60 people from across the state of Oklahoma. The people on our board represent a variety of backgrounds and industries working as business professionals, civic leaders and philanthropists," Sopp said.

In addition to leadership, the board members are an important resource for the Oklahoma Hall of Fame and Gaylord-Pickens Museum through their program engagement and participation as well as their wide varieties of knowledge and expertise.

"We know Chairman Barrett strongly supports education," Sopp said. "He's been instrumental in the growth of Citizen Potawatomi Nation over the past many decades. His leadership and expertise in governance is probably something we'll tap into a bit with him. (Board members are) a sounding board for everything we do here at the organization." Barrett started his three-year term in January. If he chooses, he can opt for a second term. The organization hopes Barrett opts for the additional time, allowing their board and organization to fully benefit from his leadership.

Board members are selected and personally asked to serve, Sopp said.

"It is a personal ask that we make to different people from across the state. We look for diversity in all aspects of race, creed, backgrounds, professions, because we really want to make sure that when we make decisions as an organization, we are taking into account so many different considerations from all different viewpoints," she said.

Barrett's long tenure with CPN, and his vast experience in key tribal leadership positions was what the Oklahoma Hall of Fame was looking for.

"With Chairman Barrett, he is the longest serving (CPN) leader. He has such a diverse history of experience with the Nation. I know that that was a key factor with asking him to come onto the board this year," Sopp said.

CPN and Barrett are long-time supporters of the Oklahoma Hall of Fame, and he joins other Oklahoma tribal leaders on the board of directors, including Chief Gary Batton of the Choctaw Nation and Gov. Bill Anoatubby of the Chickasaw Nation.

"I think adding Chairman Barrett rounds out a very diverse group that is so connected. The tribes are such an integral part of Oklahoma and so connected across the state. I know Chief Batton has helped make so many connections with key people for us. I really look forward to working with Chairman Barrett in that aspect," Sopp said.

Chairman Barrett recently made an appearance on the This is Oklahoma podcast, sponsored by the Oklahoma Hall of Fame. Host Mike Hearne interviews Oklahomans who have had an impact on the state through history, culture, education, government and business.

Chairman Barrett was also honored by a Shawnee group that provides crucial financial support to area teachers and students. The Shawnee Educational Foundation inducted Barrett into its Hall of Fame.

Barrett is a graduate of Shawnee High School. Under his tenure, CPN created its Department of Education in 2016, which provides college and career support to Tribal members across the country.

He was also instrumental in developing the Potawatomi Leadership Program. Held annually, the PLP educates, informs and encourages qualified Potawatomi students to develop a greater understanding of Tribal operations, history and culture.

The SEF noted Barrett's support of local education as part of his philosophy that "a rising tide lifts all boats," including both the Nation and Pottawatomie County.

The Shawnee Educational Foundation is a volunteer board formed in 1989. The group raises money through an annual banquet to fund teacher and site grants in the Shawnee area. The grants support innovative classroom activities that benefit students in Shawnee Public Schools, Grove School, Pleasant Grove School and South Rock Creek School. SEF also awards scholarships to graduating seniors.

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"Announcing the First Ever: Tribal Captive Insurance Company Conference"

Does the idea of gaining the greatest degree of control over insurance, saving hundreds of thousands of dollars, and expanding tribal sovereignty captivate you? Then you must attend the upcoming First Ever: Tribal Captive Insurance Company Conference.

This conference is planned for February 2024 at the gorgeous Gila River Wild Horse Pass Casino and Hotel located just south of Phoenix. The First Ever Tribal Captive Insurance Company Conference is brought to you by the Captive Insurance Association for Native Nations ("CIANN"). You can find out more about CIANN at www.ciann.org.

What is a captive insurance company and how might it benefit your tribal nation? I'm glad that you asked. A captive insurance company is an entity that is owned by its parent company. In our case, the captive insurance company would be owned by a tribal nation. The captive insurance company provides various types of insurance coverages for the Tribal Nation as well as the Nation's affiliated entities such as gaming, health care, the housing authority and employee health coverages and employee benefits. Many of these insurance policies are not offered by traditional insurance companies or they may only be offered at a very high cost.

Captive insurance companies are a form of self-insurance where risks of catastrophic losses are passed on to reinsurers. Captives can offer insurance coverage at more affordable rates and captives provide the greatest degree of control over insurance and risk management.

Moreover, a captive insurance company also allows the tribe to further enlarge and expand tribal sovereignty via self-regulation. Just as is the case in gaming, tribes can form their own Insurance Commission to license, examine, and regulate the tribal captive insurance company.

So what are some of the major advantages of the tribal captive insurance company. In no order, the following represent the benefits a tribal nation can expect by forming and owning a captive insurance company:

Expands Tribal Sovereignty. The captive expands and enlarges tribal sovereignty via self-regulation

by establishing a tribal insurance commission;

Control. The tribal captive insurance company affords the tribal nation the greatest degree of control over risk management and insurance matters:

Customized and Tailored Insurance Policies. The tribal captive insurance company writes its own policies with the best interest of the Tribal Nation being foremost. No more off the shelf boilerplate policies with deceptive fine print:

Save \$\$\$. You can reasonably expect to save a significant amount of money via lower premiums and systematic loss prevention measures. You will no longer be paying premiums with embedded taxes, insurance advertising expenses, and huge sales commissions.

New Business Entity. It is appropriate to think of the tribal captive insurance company as a new business entity with a goal of making a profit. That profit, or surplus, can be returned to the tribe on an annual basis. The goal is to save money for the tribe and for the captive insurance company to write a check to the tribe each year.

No Political Instability. The captive insurance company is owned and controlled by the tribal nation. The captive must always act in the best interests of the tribal nation. Therefore, the captive will not be subject to political instability as we've witnessed with the state of Oklahoma in recent years:

Employee Benefits. Captives can offer their parent tribal nation's employees a wide range of employee health care and employee benefits. These coverages are totally controlled by the Tribal Nation;

They Did It – So Can You. Today there are over 7,000 captive insurance companies worldwide. The first captive insurance company was formed nearly 100 years ago. It is a proven concept with a successful history. A captive insurance company is just that; it is an insurance company. Many organizations, large and small, have successfully benefited from owning a captive insurance company. They Did It – So Can You.

So now that we know what captives are and their primary benefits, let's talk about the conference. CIANN is hosting the First Ever Tribal Captive Insurance Company Conference. CIANN, the Captive Insurance Association for Native Nations, is the organization conducting the conference. While the exact date has yet to be finalized, it is expected to be a 2-day conference during February 2024. The conference site will be at the beautiful Gila River Wild Horse Pass Casino and Hotel in Chandler, AZ.

The agenda is expected to encompass such topics as: Why Form a Tribal Captive? Captives 101, Captive Formation Stories, Sovereignty and Self-Regulation: The Tribal Domicile, Using a Captive for Employee Benefits, and much more.



7 ways to protect yourself from online fraud

Fraud is on the rise and the trends in online fraud are constantly changing, but we've seen a big influx of scammers impersonating banks or financial institutions in the last quarter or so.

In some iterations of the scam, scammers will reportedly text people pretending to be the bank and ask them to click on a link to verify information. Once they click that link, they grant access to all of their online banking information and now the scammers can send out large amounts of money.

How to protect yourself

While threats can come from a number of places, here are seven precautions you can take to protect your online accounts:

1. Avoid clicking on links. Unless you're expecting 14 | June 2023 | NATIVEOKLAHOMA.US a link or document to be sent, avoid clicking on links you receive via email or text messages.

2. Pay attention to security alerts about data breaches. When a data breach occurs, businesses are required to alert consumers of what information was breached and might be available to cybercriminals. In this instance, it's a good idea to change your password if you have reason to believe your information has been compromised.

3. Do not share codes or authentication information. Banking apps and financial logins typically require you to set up multi-factor authentication (MFA) to protect your accounts. With MFA, when you use your password to login, a push notification or code is sent to your phone via text message, which you must enter to gain access to your account. Fraudsters may request this information while impersonating your bank or financial institution, but you should never give these codes to anyone.

4. Protect your banking information like you would your physical wallet. If you give someone your wallet, they have access to your ID, cash, debit cards, account information and your name. They can send money using various apps, and then you're out all of that money. Treat your digital information like your wallet and protect it as such. 5. Pay attention to passwords. Don't repeat passwords across accounts because, if there's a data breach and someone gets your password, they will have access to multiple accounts. Instead, use a password manager that allows you to store your passwords in an MFA-enabled account and autofill from your browser. Stay away from saving passwords in your browser—these are prone to hacking.

6. If your information is stolen, put a freeze on your credit. Reach out to the three credit bureaus and place a freeze or an alert so that if someone applies for a line of credit or there's an inquiry, you will know. If you're a part of a breach and you discover your identity has been stolen, visit identitytheft.gov, the Federal Trade Commission's reporting site, and file a report.

7. Monitor your credit. Prevention is the biggest thing you can do to protect yourself, so regularly monitor your credit score and report to ensure everything on there is your doing.

What to do if you get a banking alert:

In some cases, banking customers may receive alerts about a change to an account they did not make or notification of an account they did not create.

If this happens to you, immediately call the customer service line or stop by a branch to report it. Don't ever click a link. Do your homework, and if you get a text claiming to be from your, call and verify that it is in fact from your bank before you click on it.



The Gathering Business Summit to champion diversity at River Spirit this July

(TULSA, Okla.) The American Indian Chamber of Commerce of Oklahoma (AICCO) will return to River Spirit Casino and Resort this July for The Gathering Business Summit. Organizers say this year is all about championing more diversity within national economies.

"Our goal is to not just highlight and promote diversity throughout Oklahoma and across the US," AICCO State Board President Bailey Walker said. The chamber has since branched out to additional chapters throughout the state, including an Oklahoma City chapter and an Eastern chapter in Okmulgee.

Now in its 8th year, The Gathering, AICCO's biggest annual event of the year will return to its Tulsa roots, taking place Sunday, July 23, through Tuesday, July 25.

Full conference registration, One Day Passes, Vendor Booth Registration, and Artisan Registration are available for purchase here.

Over the years, The Gathering has expanded from speakers and vendors to full-scale business matchmaking and multiple networking opportunities. Topics range from successful field-tested strategies of local organizations, how to secure government contracts, and getting funding and resources for small businesses.

Attendees, chamber members and non-members alike, are also from varied public and private sectors, such as telecommunication firms, digital enterprises, federal contractors, and even fashion designers and other artists.

"Looking back at history, Native Americans have always evolved to survive," Walker said. "This goes hand-in-hand with why Indian Country businesses are thriving and worthy of time and investment today." Walker said diversity sparks innovation when integrated into business, bringing different perspectives together to build best practices of success. That diversity-fueled innovation is what he hopes to highlight at this year's event.

The Gathering's diversity spotlight will also be facilitated by directors of preferred Indian-owned programs and Tribal Employment Rights Offices (TEROs) from a number of tribes across Oklahoma in attendance this July.
